Guidelines and Application Process (2023-2024)

Two \$1000 College Scholarships are available to Moore County public high school seniors to encourage active participation of youth in the American political process and in service to their community, both now and in the future.

Eligibility: Students applying must have at least a “B” average. Scholarship winners will be announced in February of the senior year. A “B” average must be maintained through high school graduation.

Application Process/Timeline

Mid-September – Scholarship Applications will be emailed to the high school guidance counselor/contact person. These forms are also available to download: www.LWVMC.org

November 29: Application, resume, recommendations, and essay due to guidance counselor. Include a school transcript and ACT transcript provided by the guidance department with the application documents.

Nov.30-Dec. 1: Completed scholarship application packets picked up by a LWVMC member.

December 2-31: Applications reviewed by the LWV Scholarship Committee. Two finalists from each school will be selected for interviews.

January 9-24, 2024: Finalists personally interviewed by the LWVMC Scholarship Committee.

February 7: Three Scholarship recipients announced following the LWVMC Board meeting.

March: Scholarships officially presented at the LWVMC monthly meeting.

May: Scholarship checks mailed to the scholarship winners.
